Commander's Comments



Here we are up and running with the summer activities. We started the year with our PA events that went well, starting with the Mid America Boat Sports and Travel Show, to the Twin Creek Theatre for the showing of the *Finest Hour*. We will continue this summer with the Air Show at Offutt, and other scheduled events.

Last year and continuing into this year we have had the opportunity to work with the Boy Scouts of America in providing a paddle craft safety presentation and Life Jacket instruction for their Tri-State High Adventure Base. The trek is a 164.6-mile journey down the Missouri River, from the Clay County Boat Ramp, Vermillion, South Dakota to the Omaha Riverfront Marina, Lewis & Clark Landing, Omaha, Nebraska. This year they had 10 crews over the course of 5 weekends.

Our PE classes have continued to be successful and well attended. We are running into a problem finding adequate climate controlled environments to hold classes any larger than 10-15 without having to pay a fee. We are continuing to explore alternative contacts for spaces.

We are now into our patrol season with a few shake down runs completed, and some training yet to do. A couple of things to remember, ALL patrol orders **must** be submitted at least two weeks in advance, anything short of that there is a good chance that they won't be approved. Another change for this season, as recently published by the OTO, is "happen upon". We must request permission from Sector prior to putting any line onto a disabled vessel. As you know most small craft boaters do not have a marine radio to broadcast for assistance, so again, request permission.

Mandatory Training: We have made some really good progress and I commend those FCs and MTs for that effort, however, I also know we still have some work that needs to be done. This is not an "option". Going forward, these will need to be completed for appointment, election and certifications. Highly encourage your members to get them completed.

Recruiting still continues to be a challenge. We must continue to promote the Auxiliary and its activities at every opportunity PA, PE, VE etc. It still amazes me for the last three years, just in the classes I teach, that out of a PE class of 20-30 students, both adults and teens, so few have heard of us until they signed up for the class. We must try to collectively get the message out.

Several members attended the Change of Command ceremony at the Coast Guard Station Omaha, for Master Chief Jason Willey. What a great time and sad time. Master Chief Willey has really stepped up as far as making the Auxiliary feel welcome within his organization. We have an office space, desk, and a communication jack adjacent to the desk. So, we have a great start to continuing that relationship with Senior Chief Wunch.

In closing, I cannot say enough to those members wearing multiple hats, from FCs, down to each flotilla member. It seems that every year each of us gets a little more added to our already overflowing plate. I truly appreciate those dedicated members that have as much as they can. However, we must remember also that each of us is wearing multiple

hats. So, be patient, kind, courteous and understanding in how you communicate with your fellow Auxiliarists. We all have a lot going on in our own individual world.

Again, I want to thank each of you for your hard work and dedication to the Auxiliary missions.

June – Jeopardy (Categories: Forms, Water Rules, Acronyms, USCG and USCGAUX History, and What Every Crew Should Know)

July – Standardized Auxiliary Boat Operations Training (SABOT) - Towing

1. As summer kicks into high gear so does our exposure to risk. Since Memorial Day, the traditional

kickoff of the summer season, we have experienced 53 off-duty mishaps. These mishaps range from slips, trips, and falls from sports and water-related activities, burns to the face and hands from using gasoline to light grills, to traumatic brain injuries from not wearing proper protective equipment. Sadly, all of these mishaps were totally preventable.

- 2. Off-duty/recreational mishaps account for the vast majority of injuries, hospitalizations, and lost workdays. Summer presents unique opportunities to participate in recreational activities, and while these activities can be a great source of fun and joy, they can also present unique risks. I know most of us have read summer safety messages before, but I always seem to pick up a few new bits of information, or am often forced to acknowledge that I am overlooking important safety information. Let's take a minute to review some basic summer safety tips. This small investment will improve safety, and may save your life.
- a. Ultraviolet (UV) Protection: Summer means more sun exposure and potential for sunburn; a leading cause of skin cancer. Protect your skin from harmful UV rays by covering exposed skin and applying sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher. REF (A) provides tips on protecting the skin and preventing skin cancer.
- b. Heat Stress: As temperatures rise, so does the risk of heat-related illness. When the body is unable to cool itself, heat stress and heat exhaustion occur. Severe heat stroke can result in death. REF (B) provides guidance on managing thermal stress during operations. Follow REF (B) guidance to reduce the risk of heat-related illness. Specifically,
- 1) Recognize and watch for symptoms of heatstress (e.g., dizziness, light-headed, confusion, nausea, and muscle cramps);
- 2) Drink plenty of clear liquids, and avoid alcohol and caffeinated drinks;
- 3) Limit time in the sun and wear lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothes; and

4) Pace yourself and build-up to more strenuous work, and take frequent rest breaks. For more information on dealing with heat-related risk, go to:

- c. Travel: For many, summer means hitting the road to vacation spots or visiting family and friends. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) estimates that approximately 38,000 lives will be lost on our nation's roads this year. What do we know?
- 1) Distracted Driving, Speed, and Alcohol are the three leading causes of traffic fatalities. Don't use a cell phone while driving, follow the speed limit and drive to the conditions, and PLEASE, PLEASE avoid alcohol if driving.
- 2) Fatigue is often overlooked or misunderstood, but may be responsible for up to 30% of all traffic deaths. Long periods behind the wheel or late night/early morning driving result in reduced alertness and reaction time. If you are planning a roadtrip, please use the Travel Risk Planning System (TRiPS) to

identify fatigue risk factors as well as access tips to prepare and plan your trip. To access TRiPS, go to:

- d. Food Safety: When grilling, use a thermometer to ensure food is fully cooked. Cold foods should be maintained at less than 41 degrees Fahrenheit and hot foods greater than 140 degrees Fahrenheit. Don't reuse plates that held raw meats. Wash hands with soap and water before eating or preparing food.
- e. Pest Management: Warmer temperatures also increase activity for mosquitoes, ticks, and fleas that can transmit disease and other infections. For guidance on

pest management, go to: http://www.cdc.gov/.

f. BOTTOM LINE: be mindful of your surroundings and activities. Operational Risk Management (ORM)

is used to manage risk of Coast Guard operations. The same principles should be used for off-duty activities. The off-duty ORM process has been described as 'common sense', and includes thinking ahead and planning for your activity. Think of the four "Ws":

"What" am I doing,

"what" can go wrong,

"why" can things go wrong, and

"what" can I do to lower the risk?

All too often, when a sentence begins with "let's do it this way, it's quicker" or "watch this" the activities end with painful consequences. Deviating from common practices may save you some time, elicit a rush, or thrill friends, but is it worth the potential pain and suffering to you and loved ones?

3. While safety is everyone's responsibility, it begins with a clear and uncompromising message from the command that taking unwarranted risk is unacceptable and will not be tolerated. Engage your staff, be aware of the activities undertaken by our shipmates and intervene to ensure appropriate planning and preparation is conducted. There are vast amounts of safety related resources at your fingertips. Become familiar with the Coast Guard Health Safety and Work-life Service Center (HSWL SC) webpage:

https://cg.portal.uscg.mil/units/hswlsc/SafeEvHeal th/SitePages/Home.aspx. Get acquainted with your HSWL SC Safety and Environmental Health Officer, they are there to assist. Be intrusive, the safety, health, and well-being of your members depend on it!

4. As outlined in the Human Capital Strategy, a safe and healthy workforce is required to maintain operational readiness. To meet the mission needs, service needs and our people needs, we must ensure that our workforce is healthy to report for duty. Off-duty and recreational mishaps negatively impact readiness. Often, members are not aware that they have placed themselves at risk. Take a moment, step back and assess off-duty activities, you may be in a precarious situation. The safety of

our members must never be comprised. It is the responsibility of commands and supervisors to discuss these risks with all Coast Guard members, and equally Coast Guard members have a personal responsibility for managing the risks associated with individual activities, both on and off-duty.


Help Wanted


