This information regarding the Flotilla/Division Designations was forwarded by Todd J. Wilkinson, AUXPA1

Greetings DSOs PA and PB,

For years, there has been much confusion over the way to designate flotilla and division numbers in publications. The Public Affairs Directorate has changed the policy for how flotillas are to be designated in Auxiliary publications at all levels.

As of August 31, 2018, a flotilla will be described by its name as it appears in AuxDirectory, without any unit numbers.

Examples:

Flotilla 43 in District 7 would be described as "Lake County Flotilla, Florida, participated in...".

Another example would be "Jim Smith, Flotilla Commander of the San Diego Flotilla, said...." The only time the state is required to be shown is when there could be confusion surrounding the flotilla's location.

In the case of divisions, the division number will still be used unless the division has a name assigned to it in AuxDirectory.

Examples:

"Division 5 in southeast Florida" or "The Oahu Division, Hawaii"

Publications already "at press" are grandfathered from this change. Future publications should reflect the new style.

I believe that this will also assist in helping market your flotillas. Currently the public does not understand our numbering system and by seeing the Flotilla name, this will give the public a starting point, if they wish to contact the flotilla or division.

The applicable PA and PB manuals will be updated to reflect this change.

PLEASE UPDATE YOUR SKILLS BANK PROFILE

The Coast Guard Auxiliary is a key force multiplier, both for the operational realm, and for its members' wide array of talents, occupations and critical skills that are usable in mission support. The primary tool for identifying your occupations and skills is the Auxiliary's Skills Bank located at:

https://auxofficer.cgaux.org/skills_bank/skills_dash.php.

Your member login credentials are required for access.

Having an entry in the Skills Bank will not itself guarantee augmentation of the Active Duty component; but the Skills Bank is what the USCG will initially consult when identifying Auxiliary members according to needs of the service and geographical locations.

It is easy for you to get into the Skills Bank to add or update your information. You can do this easily through the AUXdirectory/AUXofficer web page and provide information in minutes. Go to this link:

and use your member login to access the Directory Dashboard. Then follow the directions below:

To add or edit your Skills Bank entries, please perform the following steps: Use the link above or:

- 1. Go to the National web site. Click on Aux Members. Click on Auxiliary Directory.
- 2. At the top right part of the Auxiliary Directory's page, type your Member ID in the first search field. Then click on the gray bar labeled [Search].
- 3. Only your own entry will appear in the search results. Click on your name.
- 4. When your individual page appears, scroll down through your personal details to where you see Skills Bank Detail.
- 5. Review and update your Skills Bank entries as instructed in the red-framed text box. Click on the gray bar underneath the red-framed text box labeled [Correct the Above Information].
- 6. The page titled: "Change of Member Information" will now appear.
- 7. On the left-hand side under "Occupation," scroll down and select a category." Then on the right side, scroll down to select your specific specialty.
- 8. Below "Occupation" is a separate area for "Skills." You can enter up to ten skills. The first "Skills" entry would match your one "Occupation" entry a financial advisor by profession is also a financial advisor by skill. But you may have additional skills beyond your occupation for example, a computer programmer might also be an experienced carpenter. As in the case of "Occupation," select a "Skills" category on the left, then a specific specialty on the right.
- 9. Be sure to click on the gray bar on the bottom labeled [Submit Changes] when you are done with your updates. Your unit IS will then finalize your changes in AUXDATA and the Skills Bank.

The BSA and the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary announced a new agreement to make Sea Scouts the official youth program of the Auxiliary, the uniformed volunteer component of the U.S. Coast Guard.

The new agreement, which is an enhancement of the longtime friendship between these two organizations, will benefit both parties. <u>Sea Scouts</u> will get access to state-of-the-art Coast Guard training, Auxiliary vessels and a broader pool of adult leaders. <u>The Auxiliary</u> will extend its message about safe boating and maritime careers to more young people.

For Sea Scouts, the Coast Guard Auxiliary will lower its entry age from 17 to 14.

"The BSA is proud to continue our partnership with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary as we continually strive to improve leadership development, real-life skill-building and unique STEM training through the Sea Scout program," said Mike Surbaugh, BSA Chief Scout Executive.

This new partnership will begin in Maryland, North Carolina, Virginia, and portions of New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania before a nationwide rollout.




