Change of Watch Meeting and Dinner



However; you see both of them playing video games, hide and seek and many other things together. The "non-verbal" boy talks to the older boy in short 1 or 2 word phrases. They understand and accept each other as they are.

The moral of this story is that if we look at everyone through the eyes of a child and see only the things that we can do and not the things we can't do there would be no need to try to teach diversity.

When we have a perspective member who is old, in a wheelchair, or just different; look at them with the eye of a child. Everyone has a place in the Auxiliary; they may not like to be on the water but can teach boating safety. They may not want to run a meeting but can do program visits. Please remember all these things when you are talking to anyone with an interest in the Auxiliary. Together we can excel.

- No life jacket
- Alcohol
- Lack of boating knowledge
- Lack of necessary equipment

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The Recreational Boating Safety Directorates of the US Coast Guard Auxiliary are busy working to reduce the number of boating accidents and casualties that occur in the US each year.

The Auxiliary urges boaters to **wear life jackets** each and every time they go out on the water.

The Auxiliary urges boaters to avoid alcohol when boating.

The Auxiliary offers a variety of **boating education classes** to provide boaters with the knowledge they need to operate their boats competently and safety. To take a boating education class, click here.
